

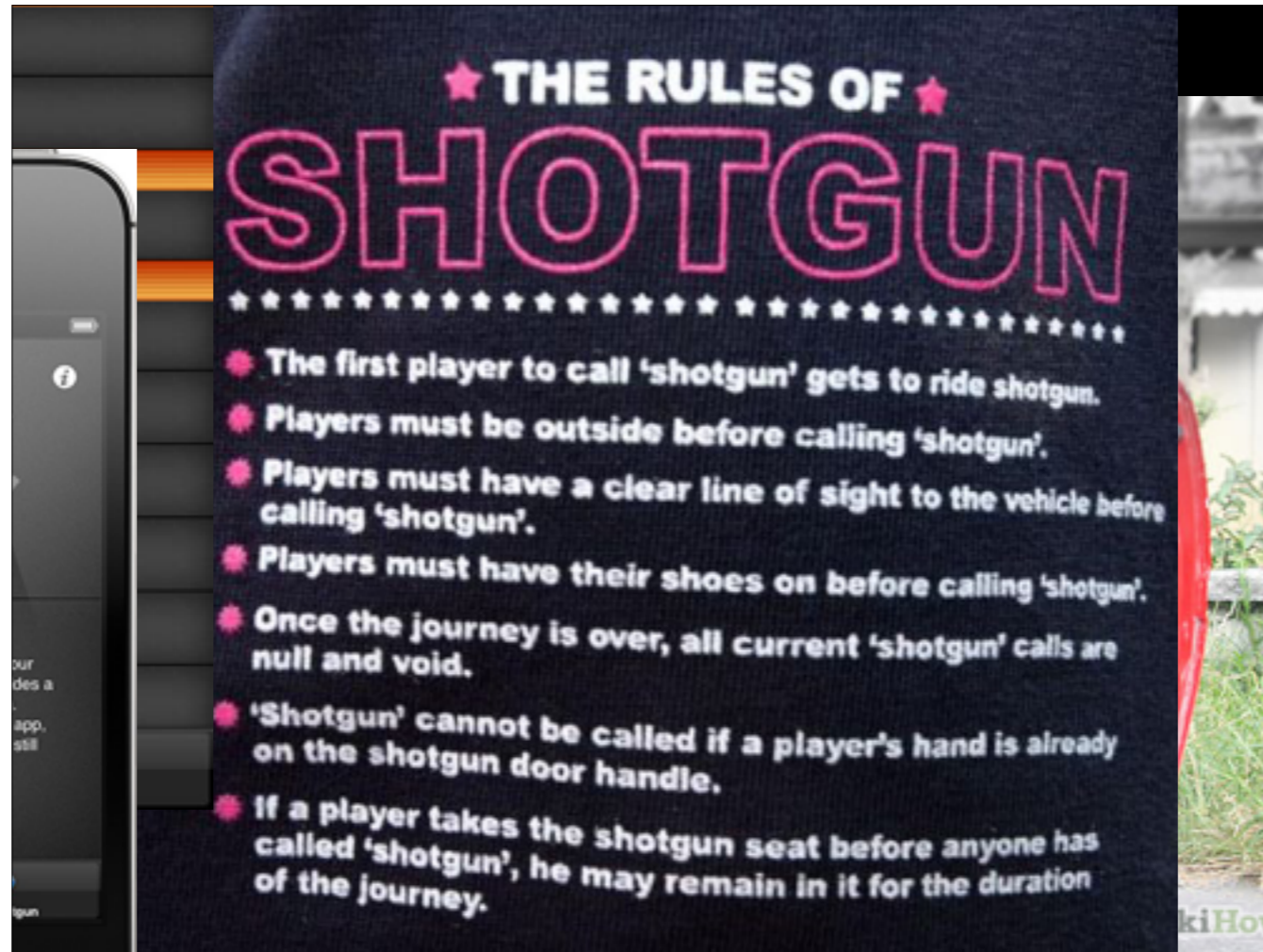

## Andrew The Power of Deference



- A disciple of John the Baptist
- May have been the first disciple
- Introduced to the “Lamb of God”

Andrew was originally a disciple of John the Baptist. He was one of the two who were directed toward the Messiah by the Baptizer himself. None of the Gospel writers were there to witness this event. Perhaps Andrew shared his story with John, the brother of James, who recorded it in his Gospel. We only know of this part of the story from John's record.

According to the Gospel of John it appears that Andrew could have been one of the first disciples to follow Jesus.

Two disciples of John the Baptist were watching as Jesus passed by. John proclaimed Him to be “the Lamb of God.” (Read John 1:35–42.)

# Andrew meets Jesus

- John 1:35-38 Again, the next day, John stood with two of his disciples. <sup>36</sup> And looking at Jesus as He walked, he said, “Behold the Lamb of God!” <sup>37</sup> The two disciples heard him speak, and they followed Jesus. <sup>38</sup> Then Jesus turned, and seeing them following, said to them, “What do you seek?” ...
- John 1:40 — One of the two who heard John *speak*, and followed Him, was Andrew, Simon Peter’s brother.

—From that moment the two disciples left John to follow after Jesus. One of them was identified in Scripture as being Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter. Andrew was not content just to have found a Rabbi, he sought out his brother saying, “We found the Messiah!” and he brought him to Jesus.

## CALL OF Andrew

What do the Gospels reveal about Andrew?

NKJ Matthew 4:18 And Jesus, walking by the Sea of Galilee, saw two brothers, Simon called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea; for they were fishermen.

19 Then He said to them, "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men."

20 They immediately left their nets and followed Him.

# Healing of Peter's mother-in-law

- Mark 1:29-31 — Now as soon as they had come out of the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John.
- But Simon's wife's mother lay sick with a fever, and they told Him about her at once. So He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up, and immediately the fever left her. And she served them.

Simon and Andrew's house was host to the miraculous healing of Peter's mother-in-law.

NKJ Mark 1:29 Now as soon as they had come out of the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and **Andrew**, with James and John.

30 But Simon's wife's mother lay sick with a fever, and they told Him about her at once.

31 So He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up, and immediately the fever left her. And she served them.

## Included in a closed meeting

On one occasion Andrew was included (with Peter, James, and John) in a private discussion concerning the events surrounding the destruction of the Temple (Mark 13:3-4).

- Now as He sat on the Mount of Olives opposite the temple, Peter, James, John, and Andrew asked Him privately, "Tell us, when will these things be? And what will be the sign when all these things will be fulfilled?"

NKJ Mark 13:1 Then as He went out of the temple, one of His disciples said to Him, "Teacher, see what manner of stones and what buildings are here!"

2 And Jesus answered and said to him, "Do you see these great buildings? Not one stone shall be left upon another, that shall not be thrown down."

3 Now as He sat on the Mount of Olives opposite the temple, Peter, James, John, and Andrew asked Him privately,

4 "Tell us, when will these things be? And what will be the sign when all these things will be fulfilled?"

### **2. Deference in leadership will cause you to empower others.**

It produces the gift of enablement. Recognizing what others need. Helping others to achieve success. Helping others to be empowered for ministry.

His gift was as an enabler, one who was happy to help others find fulfillment. It was Andrew who saw the need when Jesus taught the massive crowd in the mountain across the Sea of Galilee. There was no place to send them to eat, no place to purchase food even if they had the resources, yet Jesus asked “Where can we buy bread for them to eat?”

Andrew, the enabler, came to the Lord and suggested that one lad had a lunch with him of five barley loaves and two small fish. Then, almost apologetically asked, “But what are they among so many?” (John 6:9). However, Jesus took the meager offering and multiplied it to feed the massive multitude.

John 6:8–11 –the feeding of the 5,000

### **3. Deference in leadership will cause you to develop networks to help others succeed.**

It will inspire working together with others for the greatest benefit to everyone.

(The Spock quote: "The sacrifice of the few, for the good of the many.")

According to one blogger "Basically, Spock sacrificed himself to save the ship. In III, he comes back to life, but Kirk sacrifices NCC-1701 and his son in order to save Spock and protect a deadly weapon, a case where the needs of the one outweighed the needs of the many (somewhat). As Spock likes to point out, it's not logical, but it's very human."

John 12:20-23 -Greeks, "We would see Jesus."

On this occasion some Greeks had come to celebrate on one of the feast days. They heard of Jesus and sought him out. They found Philip and asked to see Jesus. Philip came to Andrew and Andrew brought him to Jesus. Andrew was always the enabler, helping others to succeed, assisting others to find their place. He was not one who sought the limelight or desired preeminence. Through this disciple we can learn the power of deference, the strength that comes through helping others succeed.

### **4. Deference in leadership will cause you to develop your replacements.**

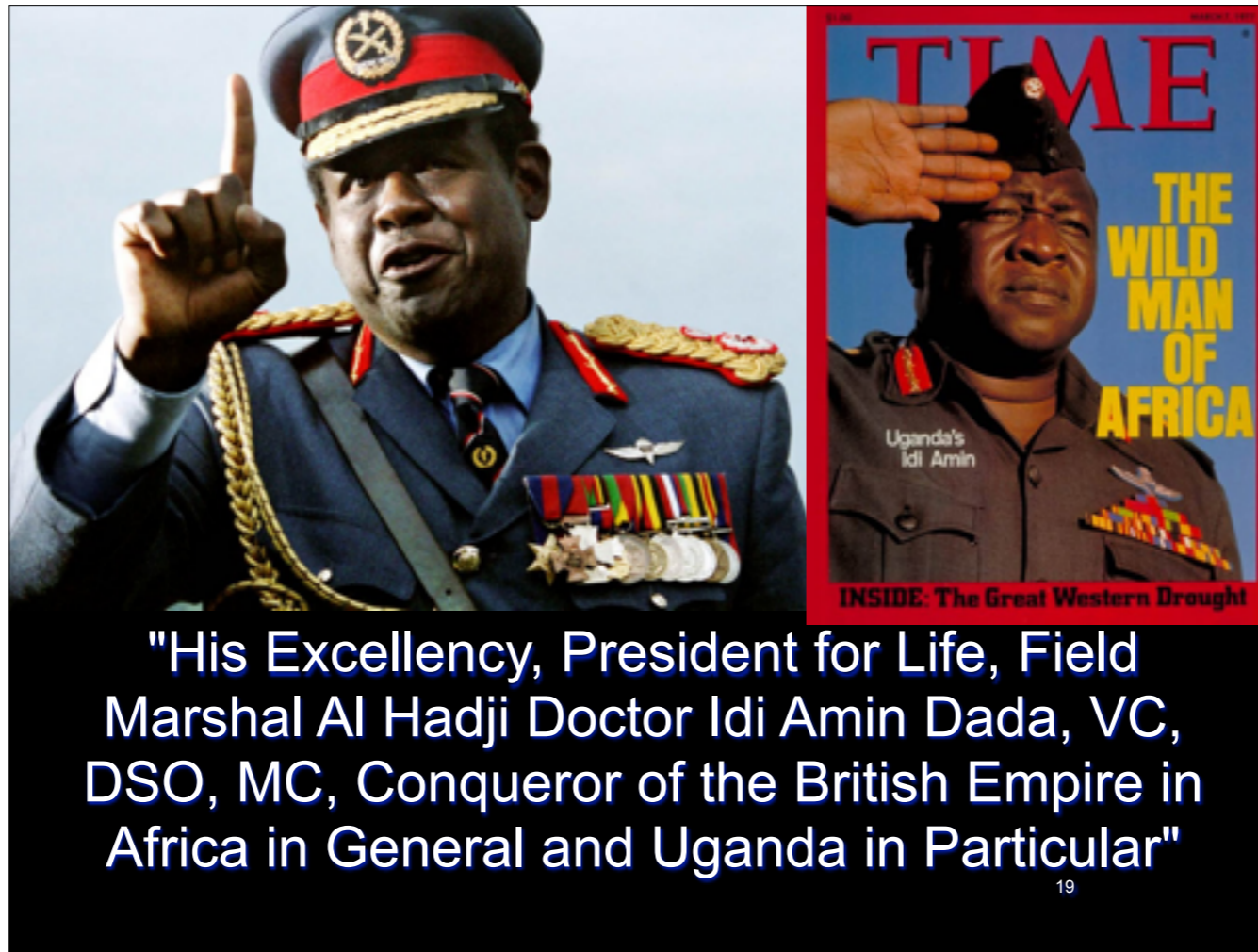
Enable you to produce leaders that will take your job and your place. This is the success of discipleship leadership.

Dictators don't usually have successors...

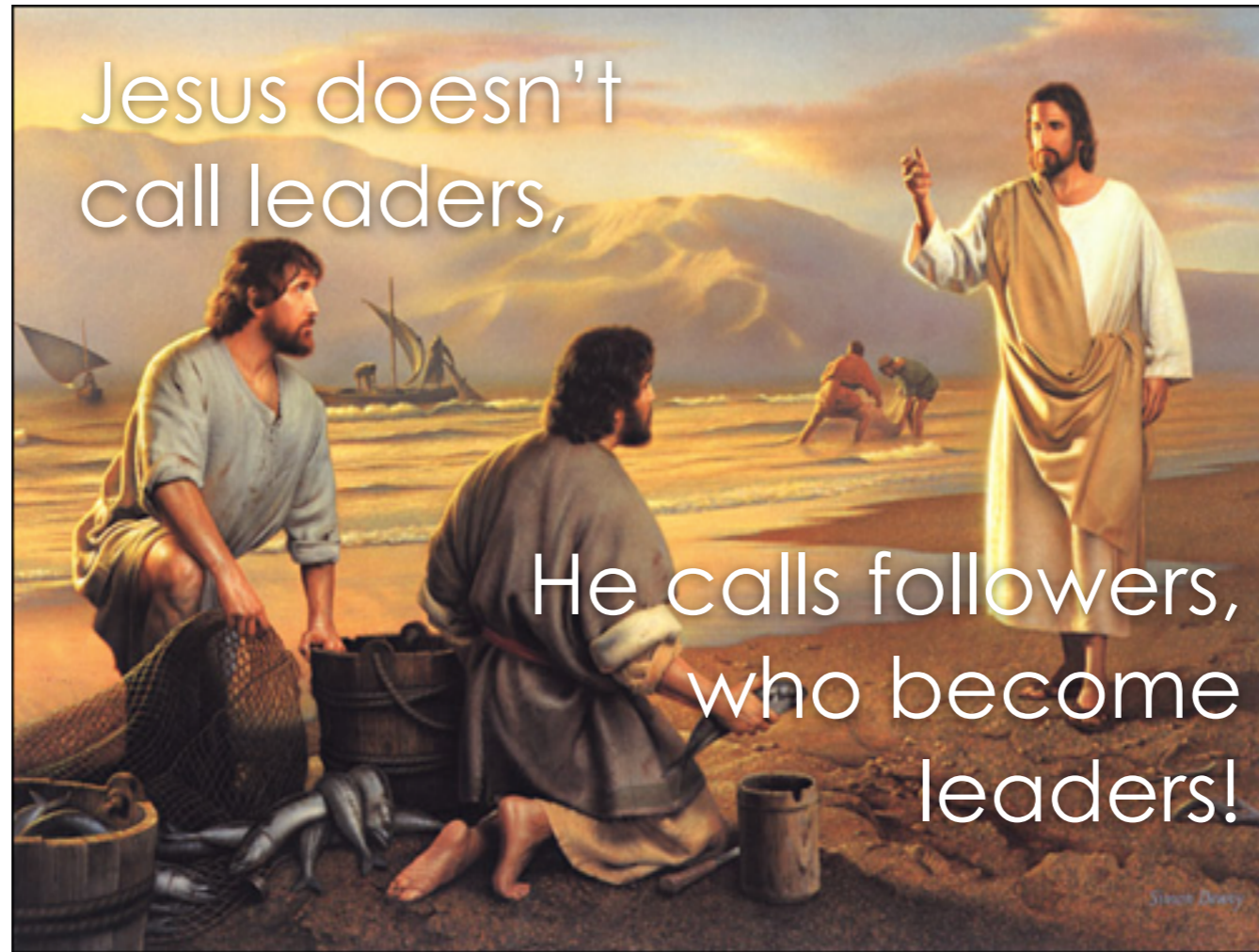

Andrew was a believer, a true follower, a disciple who followed without reservation, steadfast in loyalty and unswerving in<sup>90</sup> faith.

Andrew was a believer, a true follower, a disciple who followed without reservation. [In the profile passages of this disciple you see one who is] steadfast in his loyalty and unswerving in faith.



We often forget what we were before the Lord found us in our sin, saved us, and called us to be disciples. Or we excuse our lack of maturity and failure to change saying, "That's just the way I am."

Jesus does not call us just to be robotic followers. He does not mass produce disciples with mindless allegiance. Rather He calls us into a dynamic relationship. He treats us all as special individuals. Each of us is a unique design. His plan for your life is "one of a kind." He is not interested in blind followers but intelligent, passionate, and devoted disciples, developing and deciding day by day to grow in our relationship with Him.

There is a difference in being just a follower and truly being a disciple!

A principle of Jesus was introduced that was contrary to the popular thinking of the day and the worldview of our day. In the kingdom of God the greatest are those who serve. James begins to learn that leadership is not always who is “first” or “eldest” or “positions of authority” but to serve from a secondary place, to prefer others, to prefer his brother.

Jesus taught that disciple leaders would be greatest when they learn to serve. “Whoever desires to become great among you shall be your servant. And whoever of you desires to be first shall be slave of all.” Apparently, James learns the lesson in leadership. Never again is there a request for position or any evidence of selfish promotion. If anything James becomes less known as Peter and John assume more visible leadership roles in the emerging church.
